

On November 25, Congress passed a much-needed change in the Public Safety Officers Survivor Benefits Act. This change will now expand the (P S O B) Program to include death benefit payment for heart attacks or strokes in the line of duty to public safety officer's families. This change is long over due as many fire service organizations and, most of all the National Volunteer Fire Council, has lobbied congress to change this policy.

Records show 37 firefighters died from heart attacks in the line of duty in 2002. This most likely is a close average for many years in the past. The total number of firefighters killed in the line of duty usually exceeds 100 each year. Heart attacks are the cause of approximately one third of firefighter deaths. Changing the law allows the survivors to

receive the truly deserved benefit payment of over \$260,000. This only solves one of the problems, but does nothing to alleviate the cause of firefighter deaths due to heart attacks.

"Firefighters Die of Heart Attacks Too", a past article in *The Volunteer*, was written to convince our fire service the importance in having an AED in each department. This program has saved one firefighter in Alabama while responding to an emergency, and I believe it will save others in the future. When it comes to Firefighters and heart attacks, the real question should be, how can we lower the number of firefighters who die of heart attacks? How can we focus on the cause rather than administrating its effect?

My research is very limited in the causes of heart attacks, however, a number of issues come to mind in reducing heart attacks. Eating the right foods, exercising, weight control and most of all not going beyond your physical endurance level while on an emergency. Physical fitness programs are standard in some departments, but should be looked at closer for all departments. Having a yearly full physical can also catch problems early. Firefighting is a stressful and high energy job. We have committed ourselves to firefighter safety on scenes, but as we age and as the aspects of our duties as a firefighter change with the ever growing times, we have to also commit ourselves to firefighter well being and health.

AAVFD SCHOLARSHIP DEADLINE IS MARCH 31, 2004

The deadline for scholarship applications is March 31, 2004. This makes it possible for each of the winners to be recognized at their High School Graduation Ceremony.

Each year four scholarships in the amount of \$500 each are awarded. Each scholarship is given on a one-year basis and must be applied for each year regardless of previous applications and <u>must be used within one year of award.</u>

ANNUAL AWARD NOMINATIONS DUE BY MAY 31, 2004

Each year the association presents an award for Firefighter of the Year and the Sherry Garner Memorial Award. The Sherry Garner Memorial Award honors Alabama's first lady firefighter lost in the line of duty.

The nominated individual must be a member of a volunteer fire department that is a current member of AAVFD. No form is necessary. Recommend the firefighter and tell why you think he or she should be recognized, attach statements by others, if you wish.

These awards are not for valor. Information about a heroic act may be included in some recommendations, but these acts are not necessary to be eligible for one of these awards. There are many far-above-average personnel around this state who have not yet been singled out for their volunteer service to their communities. This is your opportunity to recognize that person for the many significant contributions that they have made.

Nominations must be mailed to the AAVFD office no later than May 31st. The awards will be presented at the annual Conference in Dothan.

Financial times are going to be tougher for some volunteer fire departments this year with state funding being cut by 50%, and with the present possibility being cut to zero the following years. With the FREE dedicated service the volunteer fire departments and volunteers provide their communities, counties and state, it is a shame that our legislators and governor have allowed this to happen. It's hard to put an exact figure on the savings the volunteer fire departments save their communities, counties and state, but I would project it to be at least in the millions and possibility in the billions annually.

When volunteer fire departments start closing their doors due to these funding cuts, this is only going to cause other hardships for adjoining departments because these departments would be required to pick up those coverage areas no longer covered.

I have already heard departments saying they won't be able to attend the Rural Community Fire Protection Institute Dinner and the AAVFD Conference because of these funding cuts. These funding cuts have also affected the Forestry Commission's annual budget with the projection that Firefighter Appreciation Day will also be eliminated. These events offer to the volunteers a tremendous benefit, Fire/EMS vendors displaying the latest wares on the market, financial institutions helping with new equipment, apparatus and stations, training, and emergency service personnel sharing their knowledge with others in the field.

I have seen the volunteer fire service in the State of Alabama make tremendous strides in the last few years. New stations, new Fire/Rescue apparatus and better personal protective gear are seen throughout the state. This is not the time to start moving backwards. The volunteer fire service needs to join together now more than ever, and make our voices heard. The benefits provided to our communities, counties and state surely out weigh the funding cuts our state government deemed necessary for the volunteer fire service.

Make an appointment today with your legislators, (Senator and House Representative) and discuss your situation. Try to make this happen on your turf, at your station. Make sure you place empha-

sis on the point that you can't wait until the next election year (2006) for them to react to your present situation. The legislative session starts 3 February 2004.

Hopefully, times will not get this bad due to the Governor's budget cuts however, if they do, Assistant State Forester Richard Cumbie and wife, Becki are prepared to live off the land if need be. Actually, Richard and Becki are taking part in the re-enactment at the annual Alabama

Frontier Day at Fort Toulouse-Fort Jackson State Historic Site in Wetumpka. This year over 10,000 students and residents across Alabama came to see history as it happened from 1700 to 1820. Demonstrations by Richard and Becki showed students how to cook over an open fire and grind corn using two stones just as it was done in 1700. Other demonstrations by Native Americans in Archery, Blowguns, Hide Tanning, and story telling attracted young and old alike. Firing of the flintlocks, muskets and cannons by the Colonial Marines got the attention of everyone; but I do suspect it made a nervous wreck out of the little squirrels in the nearby woods.

Just as we dedicate our time and skills to provide fire protection to our communities, many others like Richard and Becki dedicate their time and knowledge of history to our younger generations showing them first-hand how people provided for themselves hundreds of years ago. To see the reaction on the faces of these students grinding corn or holding the animal pelts that may have been traded for food or powder for a musket is not something I will not soon forget, nor will they.

Cardiac Arrest Survival Commission Meets

In January the Cardiac Arrest Survival Commission met after a period of 18 months due to the change in the Governor's administrations. The first order of business was to update the number of AED's that were placed in our Volunteer Fire Service from the beginning of the pilot program that started in 1999. Not including 77 units purchased under the HRSA grant, over 700 AED's are now in the hands of Volunteer Fire Departments. Dr. Williamson asked the board to consider where this program is going after the volunteer fire service received their AED's. The commission decided to give the volunteer fire service until April 1, 2004 for the primary department in each county to join in this program. The guidelines are the same, as before, you must have no less than 4 people trained in the use of AED's and certified in CPR. After April 1, the commission will consider substations and other organizations or agencies for AED's. The program to provide pads to the volunteer fire services and others in this program will be in place shortly. Hopefully, funds to purchase AED batteries will also be part of this program. UAB is in the process of collecting the data from each unit after these units are used regardless if you were successfully in reviving you patient or not. This program will be very important, as no other state has untaken a study on providing AED's in the rural areas on a large scale. This data from UAB will provide information that will benefit the AED program in Alabama and other states as well. It is our hope other states will follow Alabama in the AED program.

Wildland Fire **Prevention Grant**



The AAVFD has completed another agreement with the Alabama Forestry Commission in funding the third Wild-land Fire Prevention Grant Program. Applications will soon be available at the AAVFD Office and on the AAVFD web site: www.aavfd.org. There will be some changes in the 2004 grant application. As in the previous grants, this is a Wildland Fire Prevention grant and not to be used for Fire Safety or to purchase equipment for your fire engine or station. Policy Changes

When you apply to host a certification course within your department, you may notice changes to the applica-

tion forms and other information. The following policies were implemented January 5, 2004:

ZERO TOLERANCE ABSENCE POLICY - All certification courses, except volunteer firefighter, will have a ZERO TOLERANCE absence policy. This means that a student MAY NOT miss any portion of a certification course, both classroom and practical, regardless of the schedule. When the regional coordinator comes to monitor your certification course, and a student is absent from class, he or she will be dropped from the course and will not be allowed to test.

INSTRUCTOR OF RECORD - When completing the field course application, you will notice that a section has been added to document the instructor teaching. You must put in writing what instructor will be teaching the course during the selected day. If you have any changes to the scheduled instructor, please notify the Alabama Fire College by call our toll-free training hotline at 1-800-241-2467.

CURRENT TEACHING OUTLINE & PPT - All of the Alabama Fire College teaching outlines and power point presentations now have a revision date posted on every page of the teaching outline (except cover page and table of contents) and on the very first slide of the power point presentation. The

Alabama Fire College Regional Coordinator will be checking what version of the teaching materials you are using. It is imperative that you have the most current and up-to-date teaching outline. The NFPA Standards are constantly changing, and as a result our teaching materials are constantly changing. To ensure your have the current teaching outline, contact our toll-free training hotline at 1-800-241-2467.

VOLUNTEER FIRE FIGHTER ABSENCE POLICY - Students may miss one session per 40-hour block. Depending on the date missed, this may be any number of hours, but one student may only miss one time. Failure to properly mark absences can result in disqualification of the instructor from teaching future classes.

Make-Up Policy: Assignments, Academic and Practical, shall be the responsibility of the course instructor. Make-up work shall be completed in written format on the subject matter compatible to course hours missed (Academic). Make-up work shall be completed and documented on the appropriate evaluation forms (Practical). Make-up work shall be completed and evaluated by the course instructor prior to the course completion and final examination, and should be identified by student name and date of absence. All make-up work shall be forwarded to the AFC Field Division with final course records.

Congress Passes Legislation to Cover Heart Attacks Under PSOB



WASHINGTON, DC — On November 25, the Senate gave final approval to the Hometown Heroes Survivor Benefits Act (S. 459 / H.R. 919), which expanded the Public Safety Officers Benefit (PSOB) program to cover public safety officers who die of heart attacks or strokes in the line of duty. The legislation gained House approval on November 22.

"This is a huge victory for public safety officers nationwide," said NVFC Chairman Philip C. Stittleburg. "The fire service owes its utmost gratitude to the bipartisan group of Senators and Representatives that worked so hard to ensure this bill's passage."

The legislation was originally introduced in the House by Rep. Bob Etheridge (D-NC), along with Representatives Steny Hoyer (D-MD), Michael Oxley (R-OH), and Curt Weldon (R-PA). In the Senate the effort was spearheaded by Sen. Patrick Leahy (D-VT), along with Senators Lindsey Graham (R-SC), Susan Collins (R-ME) and Jim Jeffords (I-VT).

Rep. Howard Coble (R-NC), Chairman of the House Subcommittee on Crime, Terrorism, and Homeland Security, and Sen. Orrin Hatch (R-UT) and Rep. James Sensenbrenner (R-WI), Chairmen of the Senate and House Judiciary Committees respectively, also played critical roles in moving

the bill through the process.

The PSOB program currently provides a one-time death benefit payment of \$267,494, which is administered by the U.S. Department of Justice, to families of public safety officers (fire, police and EMS) killed in the line of duty, as well as to officers permanently disabled while on duty. The death benefit is payable to the survivors of a public safety officer who "has died as the direct and proximate result of a personal injury sustained in the line of duty.

Unfortunately, in almost every incidence of death by heart attack or stroke, it has been ruled that the heart attack or stroke was not a direct result of an injury sustained in the line of duty and the family receives no benefits even though the deaths were clearly triggered by the rigors of the job.

The Hometown Heroes Survivor Benefit Act will correct that deficiency in the law, by ensuring that a public safety officer who suffers a fatal heart attack or stroke while on duty or not later than 24 hours after participating in a physical training exercise or responding to an emergency situation, is presumed to have died in the line of duty for purposes of public safety officer survivor benefits.

According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), 37 firefighters died from heart attacks in the line of duty in 2002.
